## Memories of Making Music in Spain

Herbert and Hans Rimmel's research about their uncle Willi has stirred some poignant memories for the family of British volunteer George Green who was killed on the Ebro front in 1938.

Willi had formed a musical group with classical musician George Green during the Spanish Civil War, and was among those German anti-fascists who, in the aftermath of the defeat of the Spanish Republic, were imprisoned by the French Government in the Gurs internment camp and subsequently handed over to the Nazis.

Willi was moved from one concentration camp to another during World War II, from Sachsenhausen to Buchenwald to Mauthausen, before being liberated by the Red Army. In the post-war years George's widow Nan, by then the International Brigade Association Secretary, continued to correspond with Willi. He died in Leipzig in 1970.

There is an Irish connection to this story too. Herbert Rimmel, who had been among a group of German children fostered by Irish families from 1946 to 1949 due to the post-war hardship of their families, paid a visit to Dublin in May, and met up with Irish International Brigader Michael O'Riordan, whom he had met at a veterans' commemoration in Berlin in 1996. He also visited the grave of celebrated International Brigader Frank Ryan. Herbert's father, Christian Rimmel, had been a member of the anti-Nazi Resistance in Cologne until his betrayal and arrest in November 1944. Sentenced to death he was, however, liberated by U.S. troops.

## Brief Notes

\* The S.C.W. Exhibition at the Imperial War Museum was very successful, generating much interest. Brigaders were invited to the opening, and to several other events, and many were interviewed for local papers. We are grateful to the organisers, particularly Penny Ritchie-Calder and Christopher Dowling, for their help and support for the Trust. They have said we can have the Roll of Honour banners, with the names of those who died in Spain, which featured at the end of the exhibition. Any discrepancies will be corrected when we find a permanent home for it. Marx House, where the I.B.A. archives are kept, has no space to exhibit it, so we are looking for other suitable venues.

\* We have agreed to affiliate to the Marx Memorial Library, which will hopefully make it easier for members to access the archives. Incidentally, our researcher, Jim Carmody, has asked for feed-back from those people he has found information for. It's important for him to keep his archives up-to-date, so please let him know if his information has helped you to find out more.

\* On May 9th, I laid a wreath at the Soviet War Memorial in the grounds of the I.W.M. The ceremony was preceded by *Films of the Channel Islands*, and a talk by Robert le Sueur about conditions during the Nazi occupation and the bravery of those who helped prisoners. On the same day (C.I. Liberation Day) Rob Smith and Manuel Moreno laid a wreath on our behalf at the Memorial Ceremony in Jersey and Fernando de La Torre laid a wreath in memory of the Spanish Republicans who perished there.

\* The Summer Meeting of the *Kampfer und Freunde der Spanischen Republik* will take place on 7 and 8 September at the Kongresshotel Rahnsdorf, Berlin. The topic is "*International Solidarity - the fight in Spain - fight for peace today*". Secretary Harald Wittstock said the K.F.S.R. would heartily welcome friends from other countries. ## Reunion in Havana

On a visit to Cuba in February, Connie and Pauline Fraser looked up Evelio Aneiro Subirats and Luis Pedraza Barrio, the two Cuban Brigaders whom Pauline had met at the 65th Homenaje in Madrid in October 2001. Many of the Cuban volunteers who went to Spain fought with the XV Brigade, which was largely composed of anglophone battalions.

Evelio told Pauline that of the 1,000 Cubans who volunteered to go to Spain, more than 300 were killed. Among them was Pablo de la Torriente Brau, a well-known and widely-acclaimed writer both within Cuba and internationally, and in whose memory an institute has been set up in Havana. Luis Pedraza attended a special concert in December to commemorate the 100th anniversary of his birth.

"Unfortunately Luis has since suffered a severe stroke, but was well enough to see us, and to present us with a number of works by, and about Pablo" reported Pauline. "And Evelio generously insisted on giving us a copy of 'Prisoners of the Good Fight' by Carl Geiser, political commissar of the Abraham Lincolns and Mac-Paps, and 'Cuba en Espana', which is a history of the Cuban volunteers and Cuban aid to Spain."

### NEW MONUMENT FOR TOULOUSE

While the sculpture commemorates the tragedy of the Spanish exodus, the inscription also honours the Spanish soldiers and members of the Resistance who took part in the liberation of France and fought for the liberty of Spain.

### MEMORIAL NEWS

A supplemental plaque, carved in memory of Brigader Thomas John Harley, is now in place in the foyer of the Civic Centre at Castle Street., Merthyr Tydfil, six years after the commemoration of a carved wooden plaque listing the names of the men from the area who went to Spain to join the International Brigades.

Last year, when it became clear that a name had been omitted, the organiser & donator of the plaque, Merthyr-born Iori Williams, son of a Brigader, contacted wood-carver Ron Curtis who carved a small supplementary plaque which was officially handed over at the Civic Centre on Monday 27 May in the presence of the Mayor and Mayoress Alan and Sheila Davis, and family and friends of the omitted Brigader.

The installation of a plaque in commemoration of International Brigaders from the Caerphilly and Islwyn area of South Wales is planned for the Tourist Information Centre opposite the Norman castle in Caerphilly. ## MEMORIAL NEWS

On 31 May, Jack Jones opened the meeting to initiate the International Brigaders' room and library, and newly-refurbished building at the new Aberdeen Trades Council offices.

John Londragan House, is named after local hero and International Brigader John Londragan who left for Spain in Spring 1937 and earned himself a distinguished record with the British Battalion, fighting at Jarama on anti-tank guns. On his return to Aberdeen in August 1938, he became a delegate and activist in the Trades Council for many years. He died in 1993.

Reporting on the meeting, Jack Jones said: "In Aberdeen there were around 13 men who served in the International Brigades, in the British Battalion, including the commissar Bob Cooney. They are all dead now and I felt it my duty to comment on the record of John Londragan."

The meeting was organised by Aberdeen Trades Council and attended by the leaders of the Council, Lord Provost Margaret Smith, John Londragan's niece and various union members.

"The library's been out of use so it's a bit scant" added Jack "but we hope to find ways to send books and materials relating to the International Brigades, and to Spain itself, so that we can build it up. I'm hoping Paul Preston might donate one or two of his books to it."

## One Hundred Attend Memorial Lecture

A hundred people attended the Len Crome Memorial Lecture on 2 March at the Imperial War Museum. At the time of his death Len, Chief Medical Officer in Spain, was chairman of the International Brigade Association. The organisers, Len's son Peter and wife Ilana, invited Dr Angela Jackson to give a lecture: *Beyond the Battlefield: a Cave Hospital in the Spanish Civil War*, and Jack Jones and Peter welcomed the guests and spoke about Len's life and career.

The lecture, based on Angela's research for a new book to follow the recent publication: *British Women and the Spanish Civil War* told the story of one of the many front-line hospitals under Len's command, and covered themes like the public remembrance of the war. Photographs displayed the cave near La Bisbal de Falset, some featured patients and staff, and the inauguration ceremonies of 4 November 2001 when commemorative plaques were unveiled in the cave and in the local cemetery where those who died there were buried.

Afterwards, guests adjourned for refreshments, to talk to old/new friends, to toast friends of the Brigades in Spain, and the memory of Len Crome.

## 'EL EXILIO' EXHIBITION

King Juan Carlos will open an exhibition about Spanish exiles after the Spanish Civil War in Madrid's Palacio de Cristal del Retiro on 17 September. Messrs Blair, Putin and Chirac have been invited.

The documentary "*El Exilio, Libertad para recordar*" will be shown at 9.30 on 22 September on Television Española. It was produced by "ES-DOCU", "TV Española" and "Fundación Pablo Iglesias" and includes themes like: the Spaniards in the French Resistance, the Quakers, the guerrilleros, The Valle de Aran invasion, Northwick, and the "niños de la guerra" in Britain, Belgium, Mexico and Russia.

The film was directed, and co-written (with Julio Martín Casas), by Pedro Carvajal, and the ES-DOCU production assistant was Lala Isla. A book written by Carvajal will accompany the documentary, and will feature material not included in the film.

There are probably about 20,000 titles written about the Spanish Civil War. Quite a lot are relatively worthless but several thousand of them are of crucial value to historians and researchers. Having been engaged in building a collection for the research organisation where I work, the Cañada Blanch Centre for Contemporary Spanish Studies, at the London School of Economics, as well as having been an obsessive collector on my own for the last thirty five years, I know how difficult it is to get hold of some titles. One of my greatest friends was Herbert Southworth who used to work for the Republican government in New York. During the Second World War, he ended up in North Africa where, over thirty, he built up the world's greatest private collection of books on the war. It now resides in the San Diego campus of the University of California at La Jolla.

Herbert Southworth collected by corresponding with a network of booksellers throughout Europe and Latin America. Generally speaking, for most collectors of books, the real pleasure lies in the unexpected find while rummaging in the dusty shelves of shops tucked away in a side street of Cuenca or Bolton.

The rarest books on the Spanish Civil War emanate from the Republican side. For obvious reasons, it is easy enough to find copies of most of the books that the Francoist censorship permitted to be published during its nearly four decades of operation. There are exceptions, mainly in the area of works that boast about the violence of the military rebels in the early days of the war or about the pro-Axis tendencies of the dictator and his regime. An interesting example is the book by José María de Areilza and Fernando María Castiella, *Reivindicaciones de España* (Madrid: Instituto de Estudios Políticos, 1941). I remember, as a student in Madrid in the late 1960s, when similar books might go for anything from 10 to 100 pesetas, a copy of *Reivindicaciones* would fetch 10,000 (more than a month's wages for most people). Important Republican works were published in Latin America, especially Mexico, but distance, poor paper and lack of local interest have made them rarities too. There is a substantial bibliography of books on the Spanish Civil War in English. Many can still be seen in charity shops – especially those by Franco supporters which were published by the Right Book Club and those produced in relatively large print-runs by the Left Book Club. Some important ones – like those of Franz Borkenau, *The Spanish Cockpit* (London: Faber & Faber, 1937) or Esmond Romilly, *Boadilla* (London: Hamish Hamilton, 1937) – have been reprinted.

The rarest of all are probably five: the memoirs of the Irish fascist leader General Eoin, O'Duffy, *Crusade in Spain* (Dublin: Brown & Nolan, 1938); those of the Republican officer José Martín Blázquez, *I Helped to Build an Army: Civil War Memoirs of a Spanish Staff Officer* (London: Secker & Warburg, 1939) in which he recounts the problems faced in creating a professional army; the vivid eye-witness account of life in the Republic by the journalist Henry Buckley, *Life and Death of the Spanish Republic* (London: Hamish Hamilton, 1940) – a wonderful book most copies of which were destroyed in the blitz; the memoirs of the man who led the coup against the Republic in the vain hope of a negotiated settlement with Franco, Colonel Segismundo Casado, *The Last Days of Madrid. The End of the Spanish Republic* (London: Peter Davies, 1939) and the book that brought home to Britain the horror of German intervention in Spain, George L. Steer, *The Tree of Gernika: A Field Study of Modern War* (London: Hodder & Stoughton, 1938). But there are many even less well-known and even rarer. The history of the International Brigades has been tremendously enriched by the many pamphlets and small books produced by local history groups or Labour Party or trades union branches in commemoration of particular volunteers.

# Brigaders' Voices

My father **GEORGE GREEN**, a classical musician, went to Spain to drive an ambulance, but later joined the British Battalion. In September 1938, he wrote to tell his mother why he was there and what he was fighting for. The letter was only recently discovered in the handbag of an aunt, now deceased. George Green was killed a month after he sent the letter, on the last day the International Brigades were in action. The family knew nothing of his death until some months later.

*My dear mother*

*I would like to say as clearly as possible why we came to Spain - and by we I mean not only Nan and myself but all the volunteers of the International Brigades.*

*We came to war because we love peace and hate war. 2. Fascism, which is the maker of wars today, and which is threatening everybody's home and everybody's safety, this same fascism can be decisively beaten in Spain & if it is beaten in Spain then it is beaten forever as a world force. 3. We are not pacifists because we believe that the pacifist line is a direct encouragement to war makers...*

*For us, we shall be glad when it is all over. My idea of a good time is not being shot at, but is connected with the growing lettuce and spring onions & drinking beer in a country pub, and playing quartets with friends, and having my children about me to educate me and keep me human. And we're most of like that out here.*

*Mother dear, we're not militarists, nor adventurers, nor professional soldiers: but a few days ago, on the hills on the other side of the Ebro, I've seen a few unemployed lads from the Clyde, and frightened clerks from Willesden stand up (without fortified positions) against the artillery barrage that professional soldiers could not stand up to. And they did it because to hold the line here and now means that we can prevent this battle being fought again later on Hampstead Heath or the hills of Derbyshire...*

MARTIN GREEN

Our family's experience mirrors Martin Green's. Our father, **GERRY DORAN**, went to Spain in December 1936 with the first Irish group led by Frank Ryan, and was seriously wounded at Cordoba. He died in 1976 and with him, so many memories. My cousin in Dublin found this letter in her attic two years ago.

Albacete, Spain 21. 4. '37

*My Dear Mother*

*I just received your first letter two days ago which you posted on February 23rd so you see how sometimes mail is delayed. I am now feeling in the best of health and hope this applies to you and the family. My face and neck are suntanned due to the wonderful climate, and after I have my hand and arm massaged, together with electric treatment, I believe I will be more fit physically than ever before.*

*Well mother, I don't know what way you judge my action in coming out to Spain, but even now I am more convinced than ever that I did the only thing worth doing - helping to kill fascism before it spreads to my own country - IRELAND! Some of the best of Irish lads have fought and died in their efforts to save democracy Tony Fox, only 17 years old - Kit Conway, the finest type of soldier I have yet met - Dinny Coady, Mick Nolan, Mick May: all of them late of the IRA, they had no regrets as their deaths each resemble a nail in the coffin of International Fascism and of O'Duffy and his hirelings.*

*I don't yet know anything definite regarding myself. I will probably be examined by the Medical Commission in a few days' time and I will write and let you know their decision. I would like to see you all again as soon as possible, and yet I would like to remain here for the victorious ending - which I believe is nearer than most people imagine. There is no imperialist differentiation shown here - I get the same consideration as President Azoria, the same food as General Miaja. I want for nothing so you needn't send anything out. When things are settled up, we can have a good time to make up for our present separation....*

GERRY ABRAHAMS

Concluding, he referred to the S.C.W. as '*not romantic as written by another veteran Ernest Hemingway, but a bloody conflict where young men all over the world, joined by the idea of democracy, fought the fascist dictatorship*'.
