There were some very moving moments, notably the ferry journey across the river, when Brigaders scattered carnations on the water (fuller account on page 5).

The meeting in Jubilee Gardens was very well attended, and Chris Smith MP gave an excellent speech which drew a great deal of support from all present. The restaurant at the Travel Inn proved a more comfortable venue than we have had in previous years, and if we can book it next year I will try and ensure that the food service is better!

Gathering at Jubilee Gardens

International Brigaders, families, friends and supporters gathered once again this year at the International Brigade Memorial in Jubilee Gardens, London, in July for the annual commemoration.

Every year a distinguished member of the labour movement or leading supporter of the International Brigades is invited to give the address. The list has included Ken Livingstone, Prof Paul Preston, and Rodney Bickerstaffe.

This year it was Chris Smith MP, former Heritage Secretary, who has lent his support to the campaign to have a memorial erected on Clerkenwell Green, where the International Brigade Association's archive is housed in the Marx Memorial Library.

The commemoration ended with a minute's silence in memory of the Brigaders killed in Spain, and then the singing of Jarama, representing the first battle in which the International Brigades fought.

The Jubilee Gardens memorial honours more than 2,100 men and women volunteers who left Britain to fight alongside the people of Spain in their heroic struggle against fascism, 1936-39. Many were injured and 526 were killed.

An inscription on one side of the plinth echoes some lines by Cecil Day Lewis: "They went because their open eyes could

see no other way" and sums up the reasons for so many volunteers going to Spain: they had seen democracy overthrown in country after country across Europe by the forces of Nazi Germany.

The volunteers, from all walks of life, included some outstanding writers such as Ralph Fox, John Cornford and Julian Bell, but were predominantly working class.

Successful book launch

Warren & Pell Publishing successfully launched the re-publication of "Book of the XV International Brigade" at our July meeting in Jubilee Gardens, and plan to launch the re-publication of "Britons in Spain" by Bill Rust at our Annual General Meeting in Glasgow on 11 October.

Alan Warren said that as a mark of respect to those members of the British Battalion who died in Spain, they will be producing 526 numbered hardback copies and an unlimited number of softback copies. The hardback version will retail at £16 each, the softback at £8.99.

The royalties from this book are in the first instance for the beneficiaries of the estate of Bill Rust who must prove their identity to Warren & Pell within 12 months of the date of release to claim the royalties which they (W&P) hold in trust. Failing that, they will donate the royalties to the International Brigade Memorial Trust. Royalties for the "Book of the XV International Brigade" are also coming to the Trust and we are very grateful to Alan and Nigel for this gesture.

They are also planning to re-publish Hywel Francis' "Miners against Fascism: Wales and the Spanish Civil War" on St David's Day (1 March) next year.

Escudero tribute to IBers

We mentioned in Issue Four about Paco Escudero's novel about a Spanish youth and his contact with British International Brigaders while in prison. We also told of his plans to write a more factual literary tribute to the Brigaders. This is now complete, with an English translation by Linda Palfreeman.

"La Trinchera (Diary of a British Brigadier during the Spanish Civil War)" draws heavily on the experiences of three Brigaders – George Wheeler, David Marshall and Sol Frankel – yet

could be the story of any of the 40,000 voluntary soldiers who went to Spain to fight against Fascism. It seeks to serve as a tribute to all of the volunteers, especially those who lost their lives during the conflict.

The book will be launched before Christmas, and we would also hope to have some copies available at the Len Crome Memorial Lecture in March.

Rededications

One of the main aims of the Trust is to maintain the existing memorials. Many of those listed in the IB memorials book (published in 1996) have been in existence for well over 20 years, and we need to be alert to any alterations which might be planned at their locations.

As reported in the last issue, the T&G memorial was relocated to the foyer of Transport House, London, and at the Annual General Meeting in Glasgow we will be rededicating the La Pasionaria memorial after its clean-up.

There is the probability that the plaque in the Peace Garden in Albert Square, Dundee, may be affected by planned refurbishment.

There is also ongoing dialogue with developers and planners about the future of Jubilee Gardens in London. We were reassured by our Patron Ken Livingstone's statement that he would personally ensure that the memorial remains in a prominent position in the gardens, but we still need to keep abreast of any new proposals and plans.

Obituaries



Eugene Downing

Eugene Downing, 1913-2003, Irish veteran of the XVth International Brigade and author of the first Irish language account of the Spanish Civil War, "La Niña Bonita / agus an Roisin Dubh", died in the Mater Hospital, Dublin, on 25 July, 65 years to the very day that he had crossed the Ebro.

In March 1938 Eugene had enlisted in the XVth International Brigade in order to defend the Spanish Republic against the forces of fascism. He fought in the Battle of the Ebro where he sustained a wound to his foot that resulted in a below-the-knee amputation. In the newspaper notices of his death, his family said of Eugene: "He lived his life with great integrity, strength and fortitude."



Edwin Greening

Edwin Greening of Aberdare died at Prince Charles Hospital, Merthyr Tydfil, on 9 July 2003, at the age of 92. An unemployed miner from Aberdare, South Wales, he left for Spain in 1937. After a few weeks training at Albacete, he saw action with the British Battalion at Jarama, Gandesa, Teruel, and Brunete.

A medal for Miriam

Miriam Beghin, who went to Republican Spain as a nurse in 1936, has finally received a medal for her services after IBMT member Bert Carnall spotted an article about her exploits in the local newspaper in Borehamwood, Hertfordshire, where they both live.

Bert immediately contacted Miriam, now aged 87, and gave her a spare medal that he had kept since taking part in the 60th anniversary commemoration of the International Brigade in Spain which he attended with IB veteran Wally Togwell.

Miriam, who said she was overwhelmed by the gesture, was a trainee nurse at London's University

College Hospital when she volunteered to go to Spain. Working in field hospitals tending the sick and injured in often desperate conditions, she stayed for over a year. While taking some fresh air one day she was hit by a fascist bullet – and was repatriated to University College Hospital, this time as a patient!

She continued to work as a nurse, but carried a permanent reminder of her time in Spain in the form of a two-inch piece of shrapnel in her knee. The metal was not removed until six years ago.

Bert Carnall, whose uncle fought with the International Brigade, was a founder member of the Friends of the International Brigade, now part of the IBMT.

We were saddened to hear of the death of Brigadier Morris Mendleson, life-long fighter against fascism, and commended for his bravery by Bill Alexander. He was a one time Labour Councillor for Stockport Borough Council, an intellectual and a fine musician. We extend our deepest sympathy to his daughter Anna and all his family.

Also...

● Ivy Edwards, wife of International Brigadier Jack Edwards, died in January this year. When Jack went off to the Spanish Civil War she went round Liverpool with a handcart collecting food for Spain. She trained as a nurse with the intention of going to Spain herself but the war was over before she finished her training. As her daughter Margaret reports, when Jack returned: "He kissed her, her knees went weak, and she married him shortly after." She recalls her mother as an outstandingly bright, funny and honest woman who was a socialist all her life.

Len Crome Memorial Lecture

IBMT committee member Richard Baxell is to give the 2004 Len Crome Memorial Lecture. His book, "British Volunteers in the Spanish Civil War: The British Battalion in the International Brigades, 1936-1939", will also be launched at that time.

The library produces an excellent bulletin, which frequently carries articles of particular interest to our members. The last few years have seen the publication of Prof Paul Preston's Memorial Lecture on La Pasionaria, an obituary of Bill Alexander, an article on Spanish fascism and, most recently, an article on the work of the International Brigade Association after 1945, featuring the numerous trials of Spanish political prisoners where the IBA intervened to defend the accused.

Plaque unveiled to commemorate Basque refugees

Members of the International Brigade Memorial Trust joined with members of the Basque Children of '37 Association to unveil a plaque to the memory of some of those who provided humanitarian shelter to the Basque children who came to these shores as refugees in 1937.

On 23 May 1937 the *Habana* docked in Southampton with 3,861 children from the Basque region of northern Spain on board. A temporary camp was established near Southampton before the children were distributed to residential homes around the country. There were four homes in Oxfordshire, one of the smaller being Westfield House, Aston, near Witney, at that time known as St Joseph's, which catered for 30 children.

Financial support came from the Aid Spain movement, but local people also rallied round. In Witney, the Early family, who owned the famous blanket mills in the town, donated scarlet blankets to each new arrival. There was a Witney bicycle shop which loaned bikes for the older children to get to school.

IBMT member Cora Blyth was a young modern languages undergraduate from St Hilda's College, Oxford, and she volunteered her weekends to help the children. While Cora was at St Joseph's she met Luis Portillo who was teaching there. Luis, a Republican Spanish intellectual, had escaped from Spain with the help of a group of British parliamentarians. Luis' meeting with Cora Blyth at Aston sparked a lifelong love affair and they married and had five sons.

Many of the Basque children returned to Spain, even before the Second World War. Often it was not a joyous homecoming, with parents, relatives and friends killed tortured or imprisoned by Franco. For some, there was no home to return to and they remained in the UK and made a permanent home here.

For over 60 years the story of St Joseph's at Aston, went untold until a friend of Cora Portillo, invited her to a local history society meeting. Those who heard the story were moved by the tale of care and compassion. A group of us, including IBMT member Natalia Benjamin, decided there should be a permanent memorial, and set about organising a "Blue Plaque" for St Joseph's.

The plaque was unveiled on 17 July and 10 Spanish Basque citizens and their partners, two of whom had been residents at St Joseph's at the

time, joined the ceremony. In all, about 45 people attended the opening ceremony, including Labour councillors, the Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire, the present day owners of the property, local people from the village, and the press. But most important of all were the Basque refugees themselves and, of course, Cora Portillo.

A display of photographs and memorabilia was arranged by Natalia and Juan Moreno of the Basque Children's Association. This will eventually be made into a permanent archive of the Oxfordshire Museum Service.

Cora's speech was full of humour and compassion and the Spanish Republican flag flew overhead as the plaque was unveiled. She told of the hardships of daily life, of the trauma of the children thrust into an alien environment, and she told of the happy times as well. She told of one boy at the colony whose mischievous behaviour left much to be desired. He was "a very naughty boy", she said with a waspish grin. And there, in his 70s, dressed in his neat and respectable Sunday best, was that very same "naughty boy".

Return to the Ebro

Eight Brigaders from all parts of Britain and Ireland, accompanied by family and friends from the International Brigade Memorial Trust, commemorated the 65th anniversary of the Battle of the Ebro, the last battle in which the International Brigades took part.

They joined more than 40 comrades from across Europe and North America. Some came in wheelchairs, and many on sticks: the youngest surviving volunteers are now in their late 80s. On 4 July, a ferry took relays of Brigaders across the Ebro at Miravet. As they made the crossing, they threw red carnations into the river to honour the memory of their fallen comrades. Banners and flowers were laid out to the Republican memorial in Flix in a moving and colourful tribute to the Brigades. Voices were lifted in rousing choruses of ¡Ay Carmela!, Jarama and other Republican songs, ending with the Internationale.

The following day, the volunteers for liberty made the journey up to the old town of Corbera on the hill above the new town. It stands in ruins, just as it was left after the fighting. Under a blazing sun, they listened to speeches in honour of the French volunteers of the International Brigade, and about the part surviving volunteers and Spanish Republicans played in the French resistance to Nazi occupation in World War Two. The British Brigaders who made the journey to the Ebro commemoration were Ron Bates, Bob Doyle, Jack Edwards, Sol Frankel, Steve Fullarton, David Marshall, Bernard McKenna, and Michael O'Riordan.

65th anniversary of the farewell to the International Brigades

Angela Jackson writes from Spain...

On behalf of our association, No Jubilem La Memoria, I am writing to tell you about the events that are being organised in Catalonia to commemorate the 65th anniversary of the farewell to the International Brigade. The provisional programme is included below. A more detailed programme will be published later.

Rather than a "homage", with all that the term has come to imply, the main focus will be on the recovery and preservation of the memory of what happened in this part of Catalonia during the war, and on education. The commemoration will include an exhibition of photographs, some of which have never been on public display before, a tour of local sites related to the Brigades and a conference. We plan to offer a choice of seminars in Spanish and English, and written translations whenever possible. Should any Brigaders be able to attend, we hope that they would agree to take part in short seminars, talking in particular to young people and answering their questions with an interpreter if necessary. It is hoped that all those attending will wear badges, giving their names and an indication of their particular interests so that contact with others can more easily be made. The programme will also include the inaugura-

tion of a new memorial by the Marçà town council to the Brigaders who fought in the Battle of the Ebro.

Regrettably, we cannot offer to pay for Brigaders' flights, but with sufficient notice of arrival times, they can be met at the airport and brought here by car. There are direct trains from Barcelona to Montblanc and Marçà for others who would like to attend (under two hours journey). Information will be given on request regarding hotel and hostel accommodation. Please contact us either through the web page of No Jubilem la Memoria [www.nojubilemlamemoria.org] or by e-mail [info@nojubilemlamemoria.org]. We are now collecting testimonies, photographs and other material relating to this project. Offers of help in locating such material, sponsorship or donations towards the event would be gratefully received.

Commemorative events will be held this year in three locations that featured along the route taken by the International Brigades when they were recalled from the front in October 1938. The mustering of the Brigades in Marçà actually took place on 16 October 1938, but as many people in the village will be working to harvest their grapes in October the commemoration will take place during the first weekend of November to allow them to attend.

Montblanc/Les Masies, 25-26 October 2003

- Exhibition of photographs and related material.
- Re-enactment of the speech to Brigaders by Prime Minister Juan Negrín promising them Spanish citizenship after the war.
- Guest speakers.
- Inauguration of a commemorative plaque.

Barcelona, 28 October 2003

- The Catalan Friends of the International Brigades (Asociació d' Amics de les Brigades Internacionals de Catalunya) will be holding a commemoration at the International Brigade memorial in Barcelona.

Marçà, 1-2 November 2003

- Exhibition of photographs and related material, for example video interviews.
- Conference with guest lecturers and seminars.
- Book presentations.
- Tour of local historic sites relating to the Brigades, to include the memorial site of John Cookson near the village.
- Presentation organised by the town hall of Marçà of a new memorial in the village dedicated to the International Brigades, especially those who died during the Battle of the Ebro.

Brother helps to keep memories alive in the valleys



Of the 200 volunteers from Wales, the majority came from the valleys. Thirty-four were killed fighting alongside the Spanish people for freedom and democracy. Many Brigaders who went from the valleys saw the fight in Spain against fascism as a continuation of their fight against what they saw as the “fascist” state in Britain that had locked

many of them up, and had used the army to repress the miners.

Arnold Owen, now 85, is the younger brother of volunteer Frank Owen. Although he had a young family, he volunteered to fight in Spain and, at the age of 34, was killed in July 1937 at Brunete, where many Welsh volunteers lost their lives. Arnold has devoted much of his spare time over the past 10 years to publicising the heroic part these volunteers played in the war in Spain by taking a travelling exhibition to many towns and villages in South Wales. He has also made it his job to see that each volunteer is commemorated appropriately in their particular village and valley.

There are now 12 memorials existing in Wales, all of which have been erected in recent years. However, a plaque to Harry Dobson, unveiled in Tonypany Library in 1938, is so far untraceable. Arnold hopes to get another four memorials erected this year.

65 years ago: La Pasionaria's historic speech to the International Brigades

This year's Annual General Meeting in Glasgow is timely. It will be 65 years almost to the day since Dolores Ibaruri, "La Pasionaria", made her legendary farewell speech to the International Brigades as they prepared to leave the battlefields of Spain.

As the IBMT joins with friends and supporters in re-dedicating the famous La Pasionaria memorial that stands over the Clyde, a testament to those who left these shores to join their comrades in the fight against fascism in Spain, it is fitting that La Pasionaria's farewell address will be read by Dolores Long, the daughter of Sam Wild, the last commander of the British Battalion in Spain.

"Comrades of the International Brigades! Political reasons, reasons of state, the good of that same cause for which you offered your blood with limitless generosity, send some of you back to your countries and some to forced exile. You can go with pride. You are history. You are legend. You are the heroic example of the solidarity and the universality of democracy... We will not forget you; and, when the olive tree of peace puts forth its leaves, entwined with the laurels of the Spanish Republic's victory, come back!"

"¡Comaradas de las Brigadas Internacionales! Razones políticas, razones de estado, la salud de esa misma causa por la cual vosotros ofrecisteis vuestra sangre con generosidad sin límites, os hacen volver a vuestra patria a unos, a la forzada emigración a otros. Podéis marchar orgullosos. Sois la historia, sois la leyenda, sois el ejemplo heroico de la solidaridad y de la universalidad de la democracia... No os olvidaremos; y cuando el olivo de la paz florezca, entrelazado con los laureles de la victoria de la República Española, ¡volved!"
